Currently if you are a guy and you're wearing colorful things then you can be bullied for this because a „real man” would never wear „girly” colors, and if you are a girl, who never wore any dresses or never used make-up, then, accordingly, you are not a real woman.

But is it true that an ordinary piece of fabric makes us who we truly are? Isn't it the education we got from our parents? Or our behaviors and decisions we make throughout our life? I think it's not that hard to realize that a piece or textile does not define our gender, and no one should care what will you wear today or tomorrow.

Let the fashion revolution start...

One of the most revolutionary and genius personalities was Coco Chanel, a French designer who shocked the whole world with her ideas of fashion. Basically, she was the first person who proved that women don't wear only dresses. For many people it was a real shock to see this. First of all, because she was a woman, and we all know that back then, women didn't have the same rights as they do now. Therefore, Chanel became an inspiration for everyone who fought for equality and getting rid of stereotypes in fashion.

Chanel's first triumph was her innovation of using jersey fabric, that was traditionally related to the production of underwear, however she used this fabric for cardigan jackets and pleated skirts. Her suits were designed to be more practical than beautiful. In 20s Chanel presented her tweed suit which was completely inspired by male suits [1]. Also, one her most iconic innovation were trousers for women. Although during the war, women often had to wear trousers to do traditionally male jobs, she made this item permanent and necessary in women's wardrobe. Coco Chanel was a genius; she was one of the first who borrowed men's clothing to create women's clothing [2]. Certainly, Chanel remains the most influential designer of all the time, on her example, we can already understand that the concept of fashion is deeper than we actually can imagine, there are no limits and nothing can stop you from creating art.

Another exceptional person is Jean Paul Gaultier. At the beginning of his career as a designer, everyone criticized him and no one believed he would become so successful. He is clearly one of the prime examples of non-standard in the fashion industry. This man created art out of nothing. During the fall shows in London and Paris in 1984, Jean Paul Gaultier presented his line of skirts for men, it was a real breakthrough in men's fashion and caused some controversy [3]. Later he started to include only unisex collection that followed his idea of fluidity of the gender, because his main inspiration was mixing types and genders.

All types of clothes are for all types of people

Considering that gender is currently being discussed at the forefront of fashion, obviously, the classification of clothing seems to be very outdated. Sex and gender were never binary, so why do we have different fashion standards? These attempts to completely separate men's clothing from women's clothing exclude the non-binary persons who don't share gender restrictions [4]. Allowing this separation in the fashion industry means – limiting the expression through clothing.

To be honest, I am very glad to see that more and more famous brands are no longer prisoners of stereotypes. With each passing season, designers push the gender binary of women's and men's closer to a gender unity. Givenchy, Gucci, Celine, Louis Vuitton, Versace all are going unisex [5]. I think this is another great reason to finally understand that stereotypes have no place in the fashion industry, at least because they make everything look a little tasteless and basic. However, unisex dressing won't be just a passing trend because it opens doors into new world that falls somewhere between two sexes. It's good to admit that dressing androgynous is not a problem as it's your body and your choice, also it's a piece of fabric it's not hurting anyone. We need to mention that it's not only about women in pants or men in skirts, it's even more, it's about the way we express ourselves and how we make fashion industry unique.

I do believe clothes have no gender and people should feel free to wear whatever they want to and whatever makes them happy.
